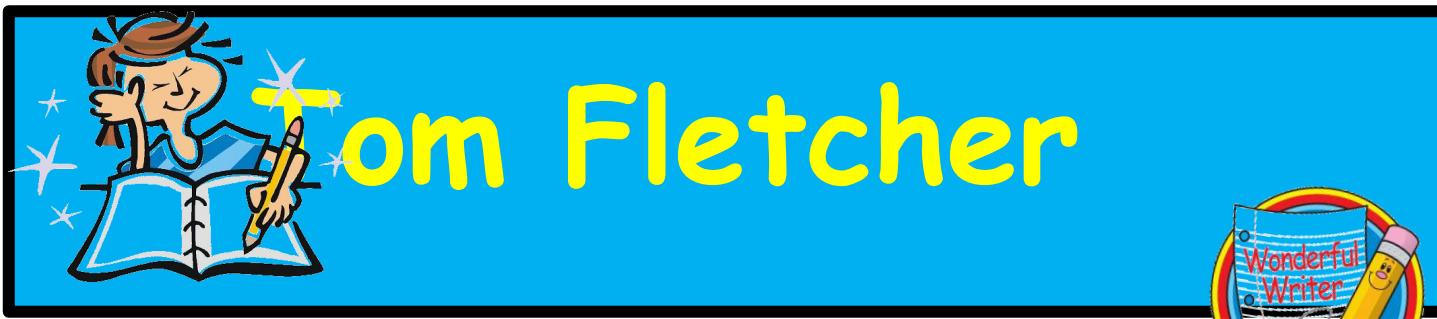


Tom Fletcher





Tom Fletcher is one of the bestselling author's for children. The *Christmasaurus* was one of the most chosen books for 2016 in the UK and *The Creakers* was a number one bestseller.

He was born on 17th July, 1985 in Harrow, London. Tom's father worked for Kodak and was part of a band in his spare time. Toms's mother was a teacher.

Tom loved music and went to the famous Sylvia Young theatre school at the age of thirteen. At ten years old Tom played the role of Oliver Twist at London's West End at The Palladium Theatre alongside actor Jim Dale as Fagin.

Tom auditioned for the band Busted but was dropped from the group when they decided that they only needed three members. Consequently, Tom formed the band McFly (named after his favourite character Marty McFly in the film Back to the Future).



McFly made it into the Guinness Book of World Records becoming the 'Youngest band to have a debut album go straight to number one.' Tom has not only written songs for McFly but has also written songs for bands, including Busted, One Direction and The Vamps.

Tom's talents as a songwriter have led him to write ten UK number one singles and twenty-one top ten singles.
